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# ANNUAL EXPO FOCUSES ON THE "PRE-SEASON" OF CAREGIVING

# VNHCH partnered with Memorial Hospital to present the annual MWV Caregiver Expo. The free event was offered for caregivers, and those who may be caregivers in the future.

We were very touched to receive this note from an Expo attendee, Steve Terhune, who is caregiver for his wife Kathy. We had to share excerpts from his wonderful note on his experience at the event:

"The Caregiver EXPO was awesome. I was guided to the EXPO by medical professionals that are treating my wife, Kathy, for Alzeheimer's disease (AD).

I found the first presentation, with Maureen Cason Hanlon, reinforced some of the caregiver tips I was already following. Strategies like reminiscing and reviewing photos are a few of the tips we have been currently doing. I give Kathy as much independence as I can.

I was already familiar with the visual care and technology portion of the EXPO and it was nice to hear that this technology will be playing a larger part in patient care.

The medication safety presentation by Karen Chase was informative. Any time a patient takes multiple medications there are going to be interactions. Stressing the importance of keeping the health care provider informed of all medications, vitamins and supplements is crucial to patient safety and care.

The breakout sessions were informative. I am using some of the techniques shown in the car transfer safety session. By using the method from the breakout session I have found the pain I have in my interior left hip is reduced.

The recognizing scammer and fraud reaffirmed that there are people always finding methods to prey on the elderly.

Smart technology in the home was eye opening. Now caregivers can check on relatives and friends using Alexa or Echo. Maybe the day will come that I need this technology but it is not today. Hopefully by the time I need this technology it will have been improved even more.

Thank you for taking the time to put together this expo. I have some takeaways from the day. First, there are always people worse off than I am. I cannot imagine the trials of caring for a parent that requires significant travel time to visit. Second, I was the only attendee that was caring for a spouse. Not only caring for a spouse but caring for someone who is not even 70 years-old. I now understand the comment made by a medical professional when he referred to Kathy as being young. Lastly, knowing the care techniques I have been using are correct.

## **VOLUNTEERS TRAINED FOR** VNHCH HOSPICE PROGRAM

VNHCH trainers included Andrea Walsh, Hospice Volunteer Coordinator, and Julie Lanoie, RN MA, Hospice & Palliative Care Nurse.

Andrea Walsh explained that anyone can be a hospice volunteer, regardless of professional or personal background, or skill set. She explained, "We've had volunteers who are retired medical professionals, as well as younger people, recent college graduates. It's a mix. We welcome anyone who wants to find out more."

She emphasized that a medical background is not needed. Rather, the need is for compassion. "We need people who are a calming presence; those who are compassionate, patient, and are willing to listen to stories. We need people who appreciate slowing down to meet someone where they are now. Sharing in this sacred time is an honor, and volunteers learn a lot about their community, themselves, and about the process of dying."

Ethnee Garner, RN, signed up for the training after reading about it in the Conway Daily Sun. She did not have any personal experience with hospice, but thought with her nursing background, she had something to offer.

She also was interested in hospice after the unexpected death of her husband Trevor Garner, who passed away in February, 2022. She shared, "I never considered end of life planning. I was caught totally unaware when I lost my husband. Hospice is very personal, and it's an opportunity to help others. It's helped me to reflect, seeing death as a part of life. It's not the end of something, it's part of the continuum."

Ethnee emphasized that a medical background is not necessary to become a hospice volunteer. In fact, she learned a lot that she didn't know. Of the training she stated, "It's been amazing. I learned so much, especially from Julie Lanoie, RN. I would've thought with my background in nursing I would know, but I didn't."

After the training, she went home and looked up her own advance care directives and living will, something she hadn't done in years. She now plans on updating them and talking to her adult children about her wishes. She also learned the importance of listening, "I learned that I need to not try to console them but instead to listen. It's hard. We all hate those silent pauses in conversation, but I learned those pauses are OK."

## INVESTING IN OUR STAFF -**OUR HIGHEST PRIORITY**

LNAs (Licensed Nursing Assistants) provide important services that help patients stay in their own homes and receive the care they need. To keep their skills up to date, we host an "LNA Skills Day" twice a year. Using the cutting-edge technology of our TERi™ training manikin, our LNAs learn important skills and techniques.

At our most recent LNA Skills Day, our own occupational therapist, Hannah Sparks, along with Jennifer Golkowski, APRN-AGANCP spoke about managing diabetes for caregivers. Measuring blood pressures, heart rates, blood oxygen levels, and arm circumferences are some of the competencies reviewed, as well as practicing proper gowning procedures. Wound care and ostomy appliance application are also topics covered during the trainings. These in-services teach skills and techniques critical for the personal development of our wonderful LNAs.
